

Voting Is Easy in Ohio

To all Ohio voters: There has been a lot of discussion about recent changes in the voting laws. Some of that discussion has informed and some of it has misled. As the chief elections official in our state I want you to have the facts about how easy it is to vote in Ohio. Please use it to guide your many choices in casting a ballot in General Election this November.

Option 1 - Vote by Mail

Around Labor Day, my office will be sending all registered voters an application to vote by mail. Complete it, return it in the envelope provided and your ballot will be mailed to you starting 28 days before the election. Then, when it is most convenient for you and from the comfort of your own home, you can fill out your ballot.

Many will choose to mail it back in the security envelope provided, never having to leave home to vote. Still others will choose to drop it off at the board of elections – either way your ballot will be counted as part of the official tally on Election Day.

Option 2 - Vote Early In Person

Beginning on October 7, 2014, and over the course of four weeks, you can go to your local board of elections during regular business hours to cast your ballot in person. To accommodate voters who cannot go during the week, your board of elections will also be open for voting from 8 am to 4 pm on the two Saturdays before the Election. This bipartisan voting schedule was recommended by local Republican and Democratic elections officials and will be the same in each of the 88 Ohio counties, ensuring all voters have equal access to the polls no matter where they live.

Option 3 - Election Day

And let's not forget Election Day itself, when polls close to your home will be open from 6:30 am until 7:30 pm.

With absentee voting starting 28 days before the election, Ohio remains above the national average for access to voting. Many of our surrounding states, including Michigan, Kentucky, Pennsylvania and New York don't even provide an early voting option. In addition, with the exception of states that vote exclusively by mail, Ohio has been the only state to send absentee ballot applications to all voters ahead of the election. These steps meant that Ohioans did not experience long lines at the polls that other states did in 2012 when approximately one in three Ohio voters chose to vote prior to Election Day. In fact, independent studies said the wait time in Ohio was 11 minutes.

Ohio is the most important swing state in the nation and as Secretary of State, I will continue to work to build the best system of elections in the nation where it will continue to be easy to vote and hard to cheat.

Last week, the ACLU of Ohio sent the attached letter to the Hamilton County Board of Elections regarding our concerns over the proposal to move the location of early voting to the suburban neighborhood of Mt. Airy.

I am also enclosing a map we produced of Hamilton County. As you can see, the map uses American Community Survey statistics to illustrate how relocation of the early voting site would negatively affect voters who rely on public transportation.

We sent this information to the Board of Elections in the hopes that they would reach a compromise at their February 11, 2014 meeting. Unfortunately, the Board did not agree on a compromise, so we are forwarding this information to you for your consideration in the event that Secretary Husted must break their tie vote.

If Secretary Husted is compelled to break the tie vote, we urge him to retain early voting in the central downtown area that has greater accessibility for public transit. This is a benefit for low-income voters and voters with disabilities who rely on public transportation. As Secretary Husted has said himself, keeping the early voting location in downtown Cincinnati is "logical"--and the ACLU of Ohio could not agree more.

Dear Chairman Burke:

We are writing to request that you keep Hamilton County's early voting location in the centralized downtown area. While we understand the board is grappling with financial and facilities issues that have precipitated the discussion to move offices, the primary duty of the Board of Elections is to serve voters. The proposed move of Hamilton County's early voting location to Mt. Airy would be a disservice to the tens of thousands of voters who have previously utilized early in-person voting.

Please see the enclosed map that our office created using statistics from the American Community Survey. The map analyzes the population in the city of Cincinnati that has access to a vehicle in their household. As you can see, there is a much larger proportion of individuals who do not have a vehicle who live in or near the city's center. These individuals likely rely on public transportation to take them to various locations across Cincinnati. Also, we have included on the map an overlay of bus routes provided by SORTA. While there are many routes to and around downtown Cincinnati, there are very few that go to the proposed Mt. Airy location.

If the early voting location moves to Mt. Airy, it would undeniably have a negative impact on low-income voters and those who rely on public transportation. Travel to and from the Mt. Airy location to simply vote early in-person could take several hours, which is unreasonable. In addition, this move would also be harmful to voters with disabilities who are unable to drive and rely on public transportation to vote early in-person.

Early voting should be convenient and accessible to all voters. As election officials, we know you are keenly aware of the benefits of early voting, including: enhanced voter participation, decreases in long lines on Election Day, and the ability for



Voting Is Easy in Ohio

To all Ohio voters: There has been a lot of discussion about recent changes in the voting laws. Some of that discussion has informed and some of it has misled. As the chief elections official in our state I want you to have the facts about how easy it is to vote in Ohio. Please use it to guide your many choices in casting a ballot in General Election this November.

Option 1 - Vote by Mail

Around Labor Day, my office will be sending all registered voters an application to vote by mail. Complete it, return it in the envelope provided and your ballot will be mailed to you starting 28 days before the election. Then, when it is most convenient for you and from the comfort of your own home, you can fill out your ballot.

Many will choose to mail it back in the security envelope provided, never having to leave home to vote. Still others will choose to drop it off at the board of elections – either way your ballot will be counted as part of the official tally on Election Day.

Option 2 - Vote Early In Person

Beginning on October 7, 2014, and over the course of four weeks, you can go to your local board of elections during regular business hours to cast your ballot in person. To accommodate voters who cannot go during the week, your board of elections will also be open for voting from 8 am to 4 pm on the two Saturdays before the Election. This *bipartisan* voting schedule was recommended by local Republican and Democratic elections officials and will be the same in each of the 88 Ohio counties, ensuring all voters have equal access to the polls no matter where they live.

Option 3 – Election Day

And let's not forget Election Day itself, when polls close to your home will be open <u>from 6:30 am until 7:30 pm</u>.

With absentee voting starting 28 days before the election, Ohio remains above the national average for access to voting. Many of our surrounding states, including Michigan, Kentucky, Pennsylvania and New York don't even provide an early voting option. In addition, with the exception of states that vote exclusively by mail, Ohio has been the only state to send absentee ballot applications to all voters ahead of the election. These steps meant that Ohioans did not experience long lines at the polls that other states did in 2012 when approximately one in three Ohio voters chose to vote prior to Election Day. In fact, independent studies said the wait time in Ohio was 11 minutes.

Ohio is the most important swing state in the nation and as Secretary of State, I will continue to work to build the best system of elections in the nation where it will continue to be easy to vote and hard to cheat.





Voting Is Easy in Ohio

To all Ohio voters: There has been a lot of discussion about recent changes in the voting laws. Some of that discussion has informed and some of it has misled. As the chief elections official in our state I want you to have the facts about how easy it is to vote in Ohio. Please use it to guide your many choices in casting a ballot in General Election this November.

Option 1 - Vote by Mail

Around Labor Day, my office will be sending all registered voters an application to vote by mail. Complete it, return it in the envelope provided and your ballot will be mailed to you starting 28 days before the election. Then, when it is most convenient for you and from the comfort of your own home, you can fill out your ballot.

Many will choose to mail it back in the security envelope provided, never having to leave home to vote. Still others will choose to drop it off at the board of elections – either way your ballot will be counted as part of the official tally on Election Day.

Option 2 - Vote Early In Person

Beginning on October 7, 2014, and over the course of four weeks, you can go to your local board of elections during regular business hours to cast your ballot in person. To accommodate voters who cannot go during the week, your board of elections will also be open for voting from 8 am to 4 pm on the two Saturdays before the Election. This bipartisan voting schedule was recommended by local Republican and Democratic elections officials and will be the same in each of the 88 Ohio counties, ensuring all voters have equal access to the polls no matter where they live.

Option 3 – Election Day

And let's not forget Election Day itself, when polls close to your home will be open from 6:30 am until 7:30 pm.

With absentee voting starting 28 days before the election, Ohio remains above the national average for access to voting. Many of our surrounding states, including Michigan, Kentucky, Pennsylvania and New York don't even provide an early voting option. Elections Committee 12/4 Conference Call Notes

Thank you for participating in the call yesterday. Attached are notes from the call yesterday. Please review the notes to learn more about possible action on amendments filed to the National Defense Authorization Act (NDAA): Senate Amendment 2384, also introduced as a separate piece of legislation called the SENTRI Act by Sen. Schumer (D-NY)/Sen. Cornyn(R-TX) and Senate Amendment 2480 introduced by Sen. Gillibrand (D-NY). The Senate returns to DC on December 9th and is scheduled to return to deliberations on NDAA.

Sec. Gant (SD) Announces new Military Initiative using Military Common Access Card (CAC)

As promised on the Elections Committee call, I am sharing the <u>press release</u> issued earlier this week by Secretary Gant on SD's new Innovative Overseas Absentee-Balloting System (iOASIS). The program will be launched for the 2014 elections. They worked with FVAP on this program which employs the use of the military's Common Access Card which allows SD to verify and authenticate the identity of the voter.

Senate Rules Announces Hearing on Nominations to EAC

Also discussed on the call, Senate Rules issued <u>notice of a hearing</u> on two EAC Commissioner nominees for next Wednesday, December 11, 2014 at 10AM EST. Tom Hick and Myrna Perez are the two Democratic nominees. There are no Republican nominees at this time. No vote will be held in committee next week. Senate Rules staff says there is not time to vote on these nominees before the Senate adjourns this month, so any vote in Committee will come after the new year.

Senator Schumer (D-NY) interested in Introducing Elections PREP Act

Finally, as mentioned yesterday, we just learned that Sen. Schumer (D-NY) and Chair of the Senate Rules Committee is working on legislation (attached) regarding election emergency preparedness. He is interested in introducing this legislation before the Senate adjourns this month. We have shared with his committee staff the resources we have on the NASS website on this topic and the fact that our Task Force on Emergency Preparedness for Elections will be releasing their report on the subject at the NASS 2014 Winter Conference. A summary of the bill is below.

Summary of Sen. Schumer's Draft Legislation " Elections Preparedness Requires Early Planning (Elections PREP) Act"

- Amends HAVA to require each state to develop contingency plans to address unexpected emergencies or natural disasters that may threaten to disrupt the administration of a federal election. States must develop the plan in consultation with state emergency preparedness organizations, including state and local law enforcement agencies, state emergency management offices, electric companies, and local fire departments.
- The contingency plan must include alternative ways to notify the public of changes in election procedures and plans to address disruptions at every step of the voting process including early voting. The state must review and update the plan (as needed) no later than 180 days before each regularly scheduled federal election.
- If a state has not filed with the EAC a certification under section 253(a) of HAVA the state must file a statement with the EAC certifying that it is in compliance with the contingency plan requirements. State must also update the state plan to describe how it will develop the contingency plans.
- States must comply with the requirements of the bill beginning with the 2014 federal election.
- The Administrator of FEMA may provide financial assistance to states under the emergency management performance grants program for the purpose of developing a contingency plan.
